

Tip Sheet: Draw Attention to Syllables with Clapping Games

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3RD GRADE READING SUCCESS MATTERS

WHY?

Children with solid phonological awareness skills tend to be better readers. Phonological awareness develops while children are in preschool and elementary school. Clapping out **syllables** helps children notice and hear that words have parts.

TEACHER TIP

WHAT?

Phonological awareness is the understanding that language is made of sounds and includes the ability to detect the individual sounds of spoken language. Words are made up of syllables, a unit of speech that has a vowel sound. For example, the word *basketball* has three syllables: bas/ket/ball. Clapping out syllables helps children notice the sounds in each part of a word. They will later use their knowledge of word parts to spell words. This understanding will help them with spelling later on. One way to help children become aware of syllables is to have them place their hand under their chin when they say a word. Their chin will drop once for every syllable they say. This is because their mouth opens when they say a vowel.

HOW?

Work a syllable clapping game into your morning circle time or as a fun transition between activities.

- Invite children to clap out the syllables in their name during morning circle time.
- Support children in clapping out the next activity in the schedule. For example, "We're going to recess. Let's clap out the syllables in the word recess."
- Give children percussion instruments to mark syllables in words, such as with a tambourine, a maraca, or tapping sticks.
